LATEST LEGAL SERVICES NEWSLETTER FOCUSES ON FORTHCOMING "PUBLIC CHARGE" OR WEALTH TEST FOR IMMIGRANT STATUS

EDISON — The latest newsletter of Legal Services of New Jersey (LSNJ) lays out the key facets of the newly-expanded federal means test to determine whether those seeking a green card or change in immigrants status may be denied if they are determined to be a "public charge" when the rule change takes effect Oct. 15.

The government test is designed to assess those likely to use public benefits or be deemed a financial burden, and effectively would place new limits on immigration.

The Oct. 15 implementation of the new rule could be delayed as pending legal challenges by many states are considered by the courts.

Under the rule, anyone seeking a change in immigrant status will be assessed based on income level, fluency in English, disability and health issues, education and job skills, among other numerous test points. Additionally, the government will consider 12 months of public benefits during a 36-months period a negative factor. Public benefit now will include food stamps, subsidized housing, and medical insurance. All of the changes make it easier for the government to deny applications for adjustment, extension and change in status, and that especially affects those who are eligible for representation by Legal Services programs.

Generally people who already have green cards are not affected.

The newsletter also provides information on what people can do when they disagree with a school's decision to place a child in a special education program, as well as noting maximum grants were increased July 1 for those in the state's WorkFirst benefits programs.
