




- How did we get here and what does this moment require of us?

- How do we collectively advocate to build systems that repair harm, create wealth, transform justice and harness democratic power—from the ground up—in New Jersey?


























The net wealth for Black people in NJ is 179 dollars.

Less than a laptop.

It's \$106,210 for NJ's white people.

NJ designed it that way during slavery.



From its founding as a colony, New Jersey created a racially exclusive system for distributing property—which has led to the stark racial wealth gap we see today.



 New Jersey provided each English white settling family with 150 acres of land and additional 60 acres for each enslaved Black person who worked on that land.



- By the 1800s, more than two-thirds of all enslaved Black people in the North were held captive here in New Jersey.
- And after becoming the last Northern state to end formal slavery, New Jersey developed its own form of sharecropping.

There is a direct line from the enslavement of Black people in New Jersey to:

- sharecropping;
- restrictive covenants;
- denial of homeownership opportunities through the GI Bill for Black WWII veterans;
- Jim Crow segregation;
- Redlining;
- Exclusionary zoning policies;
- Predatory lending practices;
- Today's racial wealth gap.




